

This is a significant month in the history of our club as the Macedon Ranges and District Motor Club turns 40. The club's founding Father George Porter held the first meeting on Wednesday 23rd of November in the Oldmeadows Bookstore on Main Road, Riddells Creek. The club started with a membership of 12 then, and now we have 300. The club meetings at Dromkeen were held in a downstairs garage that was converted into a lecture room. The club moved as it grew to Woodend Racecourse in the old Tote room, then to the Dining Room at the Anglican Church Hall in Gisborne, (burnt out deliberate arson), and finally to our own premises and current location here at Steam Park New Gisborne since 1999.

I trust you have been enjoying getting out to one of our various Club activities, as the warmer weather is certainly with us now!


Last month, I wrote about the upcoming Annual General Meeting (AGM), and the Auditor's Report, which provides us with a clear financial position to start the new Committee year.

The mid-week run - October

The weather forecast was for an unsettled day of showers with wind and sunny intervals, and perhaps we Mid Week Runners were paying more attention than usual to the sky as we all made our ways to the Australian Gliding Museum at Bacchus Marsh Airfield. We were given a warm welcome by David, a retired commercial pilot, and his wife Jenny, a retired teacher. Could it be said theirs was a marriage made, if not quite in, then close to heaven? They have both been gliding since they were 15 years old. When Jenny was asked what drew a girl of 15 to take up gliding, she said she had been hassling her father for a horse, and he had signed the family up to a local gliding club hoping to distract her. It worked.

The museum's collection, recently brought up to 73 aircraft after a trip to Brisbane to bring back another, is spread over a number of large tin hangers, for display, storage, and restoration. 35 of us were ushered into the main display space, settled at a long table and given morning tea and cake under suspended replicas of the first glider made by the Lilienthal brothers, and the first Australian made glider based on Lawrence Hargreaves' box kite research. In August 1909 this contraption took to the air off the dunes at Narrabeen beach in NSW. 28 flights were made successfully, but the wind came up on the 29th and lifted it so far the pilot had no option but to ditch in the sea. Another strange craft is suspended above, looking like something out of a Mad Max or Batman movie. It was the folly of a wealthy gent back in the 1930's, who watched the magpies in his garden and commissioned a glider which he felt could mimic their flight. David 's verdict?" Fortunately, he died of natural causes before he could kill himself in this thing".

Jenny explained the basics of glider control, and we had a crash course – perhaps better called an anti- crash course, in roll, pitch and yaw. Then some pertinent meteorology was presented. The gliding trick, apparently, is to find an air mass that's ascending with sufficient oomph to lift you against the gravity that's pulling you down. Air masses can be orographic, where they run into hills and are forced up, or thermal, where warmed air rises due to being heated by the sun unevenly according to the reflective differences in the landscape. The records for gliding are astonishing. A height record set over the Andes mountains stands at 70,000 feet, though weekend warriors generally stay much lower, as over 8,000 feet oxygen gear is needed. Given that flights can only happen in daylight, the current distance record is a boggling 3000 k's. Jenny's longest trip covered 630 k's in a wooden sailplane made in the 1960's. Pre flight checklists are important, and one of the most crucial checks is a visit to the dunny before going up. Nothing spoils a good glide like needing to come down before you want to, apparently.

David then showed us some of the historic and technically remarkable sailplanes in their collection. "Golden Eagle" is a home built glider constructed by a 19 year old boy in 1937, still airworthy. Next to it is a very modern and sleek looking craft, but which turns out to be the 3rd oldest glassfibre glider in the world, built in 1957. Fibreglass technology revolutionized glider construction as much as it did boat building. Down in the workshop hanger, though, old wooden craft are being painstakingly restored. The intricacy of a plywood skinned wing is a marvel to behold.

Finally, David gestured towards a dark corner of the hanger, and asked, as we were a car club, would anyone like to take on a little restoration project? As eyes adjusted to the gloom, there it was – a long chassis, spoked wheels, a drum winch grafted onto the back driven off the tailshaft, and a big lump of an engine with only the scuttle remaining behind it. This is all that is left of Squizzy Taylor's Buick. The museum has a receipt for the sale of the car from Squizzy, a natty but nasty criminal from 1920's inner city Melbourne, who died before his time in a shootout in Carlton. It was stripped of the body and fitted with the winch to haul gliders aloft, and the big straight 8 was still up to the job in the late 1960's. If you're keen, David would be delighted to hear from you!

All too soon our visit was over as lunch at Flanagan's Border Inn at Bacchus Marsh was booked. We made up two long tables, and we made a lot of racket in conversation. Thanks to club member Gary Crowley for contact with the museum, and Pam and Viv for organising yet another delightful day out.

Older members of the club would remember how difficult it was when they were young. Roads that were barely there, cars that were not always reliable, etc. When I was in my early twenties I was faced with travelling to Sydney to do a four month training course before a positing overseas. At the time I had a HD Holden sedan which I planned to drive north so that I had wheels while in the harbour city. I had the vehicle "prepared" for the journey by my local mechanic and a mate offered to come along for the drive in case I needed help on the "journey". It would be his first trip out of Victoria and also first flight to get back home. But there were other areas where travellers had to be careful, especially regarding inaccurate information, such as what follows.

When clearing out my mother's house in preparation for its sale, I collected a few books from the 1000+ that had gathered during 6 decades of family occupation. These included a couple of "Morgan's Official Street Directories". The other day I was perusing one of these, Edition 41 (published in 1960) and looking at the area where I grew up. My attention was caught by Page 80 which covered the street in which we lived and primary school I attended. There was something wrong about it. If you know High St in Glen Iris as you travel West through Upper Glen Iris you arrive at the intersection with Albion Rd on the left and High St veers to the right to travel around a sports oval, drops to cross Gardener's Creek and head to the railway at Glen Iris Station. However, in Edition 41 the section of road between Muswell Hill Rd and the train line does not exist. The Post Office is shown but no option on how to reach it.

In Edition 44 (published in 1966) the road has been made but the Post Office has disappeared. I knew that driving in the early '60s could be an adventure but one would have expected that a tome such as the Morgan's Official Street Directory would have aided ones plans.

For the information of the younger members, on the cover are the figures "14/9". This represents the price – Fourteen Shillings and nine pence. Decimal equivalent is \$1.48. The 44 th Edition was priced at \$1.75.


Victorian Club Permit Logbooks
